


Solve the clues and find your way around campus using the hints on the back side of the map! Email your answers and pics to RamTrax@colostate.edu to be entered in our prize drawing.

"Welcome" to Colorado State University! This building was once the Women's Recreation Center and was the social center of campus activities.

TASK: Pick up an Admissions brochure here OR Who is the Welcome Center Building named after? FUN FACT: This building used to feature an indoor swimming pool; however, the house-mom demanded it be drained and cleaned after she found male students skinny-dipping in this female-only facility!

"Step up" and learn about the rich history and traditions of CSU. This building can be found by following the tree-lined sidewalk down the center of the Oval, also referred to as Lover's Lane. Ten of the University's 14 presidents have had offices in this building.

QUESTION: How old is this building? **HINT:** Building cornerstones are inscribed with the year they were built.

Head west from building #2 to find a great place to stop and cool off on a warm day! Future engineers have been studying in the building by this area since 1957.

FUN FACT: This structure symbolizes the use of water by humans and the ecosystem and is a depiction of the systems of water use from collection and storage to distribution and recharge. **QUESTION:** Who does this plaza honor?

This building is the center of many student activities and houses Diversity Offices, the Career Center, CSU's Bookstore, and a Food Court.

FUN FACT: About 20,000 students, faculty, staff and visitors pass through here every day during the school year.

QUESTION: Across the hall from the Curfman Art Gallery there is a portrait of whom?

This building opened in 2017 and houses state-of-theart laboratories to support the cutting-edge research conducted by faculty, researchers, and students.

FUN FACT: 60 percent of CSU student graduates have taken a class taught by the biology department. **QUESTION:** To the west of this building there is a large art display that lights up at night. These globes are meant to represent specific molecules. Which molecules? **HINT:** They are found in our atmosphere.

This area of campus is commonly known as Science Row. Students are usually on their best "behavior" near this building.

FUN FACT: Biological Sciences and Psychology are two of the largest student majors at CSU with about 6,400 students combined.

QUESTION: Who gave the quote inscribed on the large metal sculpture in this area?

This multipurpose facility is the largest on campus. It is home to academic class rooms, the Alumni Association Center, the Collaborative for Student Achievement, as well as Ram Athletics.

FUN FACT: The video board is the size of a high school basketball court.

QUESTION: Nearly 100 years ago this artifact went mysteriously missing from the Old Main building on the Oval. It is now prominently displayed outside of the Alumni Center. What is the artifact?

Take a stroll through the grass of the "great green" to find this 170,000 square foot facility where students can "recreate," swim, rock climb, and work-out. Outside of this building you can test your bouldering skills.

FUN FACT: Rams are very active! More than 70% of students participate in recreation activities. **TASK:** Take your picture in front of the bouldering rock.

 This building is in the center of Laurel Village, providing students with programming, lounge areas, and meeting spaces.

FUN FACT: This building was the first project on CSU's main campus to receive a LEED platinum certification. **QUESTION:** What is the name of the bike shop located in this building?

EXTRA CREDIT QUESTION: What does the "A" on the foothills just west of Fort Collins stand for?
